

DSC to take close look at final draft of Delta Plan next month

The Delta Stewardship Council (DSC) will be discussing the <u>final staff draft</u> of the Delta Plan during a meeting on <u>June 14 and 15</u>, in Sacramento. The council received the draft last week. The latest version reflects the advice and recommendations of almost 250 organizations and individuals who offered more than 10,000 comments on the previous five drafts of the plan.

ISB teleconference will focus on final staff draft of the Delta Plan

The next meeting of the Delta Independent Science Board (ISB) will be a teleconference featuring the board finalizing its review of the Delta Plan's <u>final staff draft</u>. It is scheduled for Friday, June 8. The <u>agenda</u> also calls for discussion on the Bay Delta Conservation Plan. BDCP changes its plans for June's public meeting

The Bay Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP) meeting scheduled for Thursday, June 7, has been rescheduled for Wednesday, June 20, in Sacramento. Historic water tower set to be raised in the Delta tomorrow

After years of planning and preparation, the historic Dutra Tower will be raised tomorrow, June 1, by the Discover the Delta Foundation, in Isleton. The 132-foot tower will sit at the site of the Delta Discovery Center and will be used to store irrigation water for five acres of outside displays. Brown bag lecture will focus on flooding and climate change

The next presentation of the Delta Science Program Brown Bag Series will feature a look at developing effective responses to potential increases in flooding resulting from climate change. Nigel Wright, professor of water and environmental engineering from the University of Leeds, will discuss the need for responses in order to reduce impacts on the economy. Panel issues strategies for monitoring CECs in California's water A report outlining four strategies for tracking chemicals in the state's water has been posted online. *Monitoring Strategies for Chemicals of Emerging Concern (CECs) in California's Aquatic Ecosystems* has been submitted to the State Water Resources Control Board. A six-page executive summary of the report is also available. The strategies were developed by a seven-member science advisory panel.
